## New recycling store diverts waste from landfill

IT was always hard for Jamie Currey to find a job.

As a single mum of three kids, she had few marketable skills and found employers often overlooked her.

But that charged after she landed a job at Reviva's new Kleinton recycling store two weeks ago.

"I am getting out there and meeting people," she said.

The Reviva staff are training Ms Currey, giving her skills and qualifications that will lead to more jobs later.

"They do not judge you -

they support people from different backgrounds, cultures and disabilities, and they give everybody a go," she said.

"It's a chance to be a good role model for my kids and my community."

The Kleinton store opened two weeks ago, expanding the reuse opportunities in the region while creating jobs for people with barriers to employment.

Manager Jeff Prater said the region had embraced reusing and recycling.

"Toowoomba residents have helped us divert over 400 tonnes of waste from

landfill for reuse through the shop at Wellcamp," he said.

"This second shop and resource recovery area at Kleinton gives the community further opportunity to reduce their impact on the planet.

The company expects to increase the amount of waste diverted from landfill in Toowoomba in the coming years, and it also sells donated furni-

ture and homewares.
